Being Visible - Thank you for being accessible and approachable while fostering a supportive environment to learn and grow.


Being Creative - It's a pleasure to see our participants explore new and innovative solutions to overcome challenges or launch new projects.

In such circumstances, the need for guidance and support becomes even more pronounced, making programs like the Mentor Year Program invaluable for professionals like myself. Working in a solo department, I found myself juggling multiple responsibilities, wearing many hats. While autonomy is empowering, it comes with challenges, from managing caseloads to developing comprehensive counseling plans—all while striving to provide personalized support to each student and learn about the new trends and procedures in college admission.

Enter the Mentor Year Program—a beacon of support amid uncertainty.
