You will recognize the names of so many great leaders, but to me, they were the colleagues who saw my potential and were willing to share their

time and knowledge. It is a generosity I have never forgotten. In my own career, I have made a point of paying it forward as frequently as possible.

As I reflected upon the topic of mentorship, I realized that mentorship can come from many different quarters. Sometimes, as in the case of my colleagues above, the path is clear, they were more experienced and well established. At other times, though, mentors have been younger colleagues who were generous with their expertise. Peter Dorthe from Jacobs University was such a mentor – a teacher, a guide through office politics, a sympathetic ear, someone to bounce ideas off of.

In that light, when I step into a mentorship role, I take into account what my mentors have modeled for me. Do I have knowledge, expertise, or wisdom to contribute? Can I be a guide to someone navigating new territory? Is it possible for me to be a sounding board? Can I be a good listener? Listening is hugely important because mentorship is about building relationships that grow beyond the transactional exchange of information. The beauty of the relationship lies in reciprocity.

In the three decades that I have worked in admissions counseling I have learned that having been around longer doesn't always mean that I have the answers. Times change, processes evolve, technology upends long held practices. Who do I reach out to for mentorship then? Frequently a mentee becomes a mentor -Ango, Anna, Ray, and so many others. From where I sit, this is the greatest reward.

To our mentors, I want to thank you for your invaluable contributions. To our mentees, I can't wait to see you come into your own and become mentors to the next generations of admissions counseling professionals.
